INIUS excitedly welcomed Iceland's Ambassador to the United States Bergdís Ellertsdóttir and Consul Katrín Honorary Sigurđardóttir for an informative and entertaining webinar. Honorary Consul Sigurðardóttir kicked off the webinar by explaining the role of Honorary Consuls in Iceland's foreign service across the U.S. She introduced us to Ambassador Ellertsdóttir, who told us about how she became interested in serving in the foreign service at a young age. Their conversation covered topics like what a typical day for an Ambassador is like to how the foreign service is assisting during the pandemic. # Oregon Midsummer Hosts "Our Icelandic Roots" Lecture

The Oregon Midsummer Festival hosted a lecture about "Our Icelandic Roots" on June 17 during the week long virtual festival. The festival is an annual program of Nordic Northwest in Portland, Oregon and features the cultures of Norway, Sweden, Finland, Denmark and Iceland. INLUS Past President Sunna Furstenau began the hour long lecture by highlighting that it was Iceland's Independence Day. She spoke about the history of the independence movement in Iceland, Jón Sigurðsson's role in the fight for independence, and why his birthdate was chosen as the day to celebrate independence. The lecture continued with an explanation about the why there was mass emigration from Iceland and a timeline of the Icelandic settlements established in Brazil, the United States, and Canada. Furstenau also shared about the role Wisconsin immigrants had in celebrating the millennium and new constitution August 2, 1874.

Furstenau shared about the many ways that Icelandic culture is promoted, preserved, and celebrated in the United States and Canada today. She highlighted Icelandic clubs and organizations all over the world, including INLUS, INLNA, and INL. She finished the presentation by sharing about researching genealogy on Icelandic Roots and addressed questions from the audience. 

### **INLUS Launches New Website**

INLUS celebrated its one year anniversary with the launch of a brand new website. INLUS website Volunteer Jon Wurtzler and INLUS Vice President/Treasurer Doug Hanson tackled the task of a complete site migration. According to Hanson, "Our members told us that the original platform was not optimized for mobile devices like smart phones and tablets." The

site was moved to a new platform called WordPress to allow for greater mobile integration, so people trying to access information on mobile devices, tablets, and phones will have an easier time navigating and finding information. In addition to being easier for those maintaining the site to update content, the new platform has more options and capabilities.



The new website is organized better, with improved pages for recipes, member businesses and Icelandic organizations. Wurtzler explained that the site utilizes what is known as a "site builder" that allows an editor to create a unified layout using different modules or parts. Other key new features on the site are the events calendar and interactive maps.

The website is important in helping INLUS prepare for the future. According to Hanson, "A key attribute of our mission is to connect Icelanders and those who love Iceland with one another. While social media and email are essential tools we use to communicate, a well designed and up-to-date website is critical as our virtual 'home' where members, friends and newcomers can always find us and connect. We see the INLUS website as a resource that can benefit all our members and the general public as well." The WordPress platform allows INLUS the freedom to change the website to fit any future needs. Wurtzler stated, "Honestly, the biggest aspect of the new site is giving the power to those running the show to make and create it how they want. One of the biggest struggles with most small sites, especially in nonprofits, is the dependency on a developer or shop to make changes for them when they need it. This allows for more hands-on work by those working on smaller budgets usually."

User feedback facilitated many design features, including the change of platform. It is hoped that members and friends will visit the website and send feedback on what they like and what could be improved. Hanson states, "All our work is done by volunteers so changes are not always immediate but we really want our website visitors to have a positive experience."

Volunteers invested their time and talents to make the website possible. Says Wurtzler, "I'm glad I was able to use what I've learned to give back to the Icelandic community. It feels good to get back to my roots from time to time." Hanson added, "I also really like the clean, uncluttered theme that Jon developed for us, building on Cole's original work. Working with great volunteers is the best part of projects like this."

Kristinsdóttir said of the Seattle area club members, "We are like one big family...missing meeting people." There was great cooperation among club members to put the June 17 event together.— Palmason and his daughter even sang a song. Kristinsdóttir thanked Club President Petur Gudmundsson and all of the members who contributed their talents.

In addition to a wide variety of music, the June 17 event had a sing-along, an educational segment about pönnukökur, the official national anthem of Icleand, and the de facto anthem of Icelanders, "Ég er kominn heim." Kristinsdóttir stated, "Always a song we play when we get together." The song evokes joy, memories of the soccer team, and a deeper meaning during the pandemic. # INLUS Volunteer Spotlight: Jon Wurtzler

Jon Wurtzler of Burnsville, Minnesota is the INLUS website volunteer who helped update the previous version of the website to be a better user experience for those who have to post and manage content. His technical expertise helped get the website to a place where new functionality can be added fairly easily if required. He took a few minutes to respond to an email interview.

#### Tell me about how you are connected to Iceland.

Growing up, my mother did a lot of work on our Icelandic Heritage. I helped her with a bit of it, mainly to help her get it into the various computer programs we had available. She was able to acquire a lot of information from family, friends, and other resources, so I believe she welcomed any help she could get, even from a distracted teen. Family wise, my mother is 100% Icelandic and I'm roughly 50%.

I have two daughters which I call my little Valkyries.


#### Anything else you'd like to add?
